To form the present perfect tense, we need to use the simple

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present tense of the auxiliary verb 'have' or 'has' based on whether the noun being referred to is plural or singular. The past participle of the verb follows the auxiliary verb. We can also write as: have/has + past participle. Let us see some examples,

Present Tense: Types of Present Tense with Examples

The present perfect tense is formed by Have/Has + Past Participle. Addition of "-ed" in the root of regular verbs is how to make a simple past tense. The Past Continuous tense is formed by joining was/were + present participle (-ing) Past Perfect Tense is formed by had + past participle.

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regular verbs (for example, 'play' becomes 'played') There are a few verbs that change their spelling when you add 'ed' (for example, 'study' becomes 'studied')

The Present Perfect Continuous uses two auxiliary verbs together with a main verb. In this lesson we look at the structure and use of the Present Perfect Continuous tense, as well as the use of for and since, followed by a quiz to check your understanding. Note

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that continuous tenses are also called progressive tenses.

In the perfect tenses, the verb (to) have is always the auxiliary verb. In the present perfect tense, the main verb is in the past participle form. This is not difficult for regular past tense verbs. For regular verbs, the past participle form of the verb is the same as the past tense verb, so you just add -ed!

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
